


"...I shall never forget it as long as I live it was so inhuman like. The name of it was R.S.T. Espero".

For those who love first hand accounts of ordinary men at war our manuscript diary of Able Seaman Stanley Burgess will be of particular interest (p.14). Burgess served on the HMAS Sydney during the hard fought Mediterranean campaign of WWII and kept an almost daily account of his experience. He was fortunate to be transferred before it sank with all hands in 1942. At times arresting, at others mundane, it is a faithful account of an ordinary nineteen-year-old's first experience in the theatre of war.

First appearance of the term "oxyginous principle" (*principe oxygin*, i.e. oxygen).

For the more scientifically inclined we are pleased to offer the first English translation of Lavoisier's, *Essays on the effects produced by various processes on Atmospheric Air* (p.4) in which the term oxyginous principle was used for the first time, introducing the word oxygen into the English language.



Lavoisier is often considered the father of modern chemistry and owes a great deal to his wife Marie-Anne Pierrette Paulze Lavoisier whose translation of Richard Kirwan's 'Essay on Phlogiston and the Constitution of Acids' – with her own footnotes critiquing his errors – convinced him the idea was incorrect, ultimately leading to his studies of combustion and his discovery of oxygen gas.

lacking first two plates being the general chart exhibiting Captain Cook's discoveries and the chart of Kerguelen's land, with a sketch of Prince Edward's Island; previous owner signature to both titles; note in ink to first paste-down of Vol. I; doodle on last blank of Vol II; light toning; leather scuffed and corners pushed; recently re-backed. Very good.

This Dublin edition followed the Cadell London edition the same year. The Cadell edition had an atlas together with the three volumes, but the Dublin edition was published without the atlas. This is an early edition of Cook's own account of his voyages, originally published just three years prior by Newberry in London in 1781. [ML 1546]

HUME, David. The Life of David Hume Esq. Written by Himself.

London: W. Strahan and T. Cadell, 1777. First Edition. Octavo : pp. iv, 62 : portrait of Hume engraved by T. Cook : contemporary marbled paper wraps : now in custom clamshell box with red leather title panel lettered in gilt. Lacks half title and advertisement, otherwise complete. The paper wraps are considerably edge worn and frayed; the spine is largely chipped with the gatherings exposed. The portrait is stained and there is some offsetting from the print to the title page which is chipped at the head and bears an ownership inscription in ink. The remaining leaves are toned at the edges, worn and chipped with a large open tear at the tail of p.23. Comment penned on verso of top cover reads, "A most admirable specimen of Autobiography to be met with in all literature. M.S." Good.

Written shortly before his death, Hume had intended his Life to be prefixed to his next published edition of his Works. The Life ends on p.35 and the rest is taken up with Adam Smith's letter to W. Strahan describing Hume's last days. [JESSOP p.39]

George Keate (1729-1797) was an English author and poet who travelled extensively, was friends with Voltaire and was known for his enjoyment in talking about his own work. His account of the Pelew Islands was based on the experiences of Henry Wilson (1740–1810), an English naval captain of the British East India Company. Wilson was in command of the British East India Company packet ship Antelope, when it shipwrecked off Ulong Island, near Koror Island in Palau in 1783, and the East



Indiaman Warley at the Battle of Pulo Aura. Keate's rendering of the tale was extremely popular in its day and saw translations into German and French.

Antoine Lavoisier, often referred to as the Father of Modern Chemistry, and his wife Marie-Anne Pierrette Paulze Lavoisier (later Countess von Rumford) were eighteenth century French chemists responsible for


overthrowing the "false doctrine of Phlogiston". Lavoisier relied on Paulze's translation of foreign works to keep abreast of current developments in chemistry. In the case of phlogiston, it was Paulze's translation of Richard Kirwan's 'Essay on Phlogiston and the Constitution of Acids – with her own footnotes critiquing his errors – that convinced him the idea was incorrect, ultimately leading to his studies of combustion and his discovery of oxygen gas.

Lavoisier was a victim of The Terror of 1794 and guillotined in Paris. "It took but a moment to cut off his head; it will take a century to produce another like it," mourned his friend Lagrange, the mathematician. The collected essays show the development of Lavoisier's thinking and in the penultimate essay (VIII) the term "oxyginous principle" (principe oxygin, i.e. oxygen) appears for the first time in chemistry (p.98) This paper was first submitted to the Academie in 1777 and read in 1779. 

"A very elaborate and celebrated edition; it contains the entire notes of Gronovius...[and] is accompanied with a new and excellent index by Grimschlius, of almost all the words and phrases of Seneca." (Dibdin, Greek and Latin Classics., p.399)

The first ownership mark is Frederic Sinner 1769. Possibly Friedrich von Sinner (1731–1791), a Swiss lawyer and magistrate known to have had a keen interest in literature and art. Sinner was also Mayor of Berne (even years) from 17771 until his death in 1791.

DICKENS, Charles. A Tale of Two Cities

An exceptionally clean copy, handsomely bound. Near fine.

First edition, first issue, bound from the parts, of Dickens' second historical novel. It has proved one of his most enduring works – a tale of self-sacrifice set against the backdrop of the French Revolution. This was the last of Dickens' books to be illustrated by H.K.

Browne ("Phiz"), with 16 plates engraved by him. "Browne, for 23 years responsible for all the etchings which had so successfully embellished these [Dickens'] books, produced his last drawings for the present work...Bradbury and Evans, the printers of all and publishers of five of Dickens' works as issued in monthly parts, had ceased to act in this dual capacity after the completion of Little Dorrit...[resulting] in the return of Chapman and Hall as publishers of this and all succeeding works" (Hatton and Cleaver, 333).

Originally published as a serial in Dickens' weekly journal All the Year Round, issued in eight parts from June to December 1859. First issue, with page 213 misnumbered and the signature mark "b" on the List of Plates and all other first edition points as called for. [SMITH I:13; HATTON and CLEAVER 333-42; GIMBEL A143]



No. 23 of 100. Cocteau's homage to the supernatural was first produced in Paris in 1926 (with costumes by Coco Chanel) and published in French in 1927. This is the first edition, limited issue English language edition. Oxford published a trade edition the same year.

A bright and complete copy of this Victorian religious gift-book designed by Henry Noel Humphries, a British illustrator, entomologist and numismatist. The glue of the gutta percha binding had perished as usual hence the decision to repair and preserve.


The gilt stamped name to the top cover is K. Theo Garland and the inlaid note is addressed to him at

Court House, Albion Park Sq. 5.95. It reads,

"Dear Sir, Will you kindly let me known [sic] by the return mornings [sic] mail the proper way to draw up an information for ejectment, a man named George Prior is renting a place from James Coudon on the halves, and Coudon now wants him to leave and he won't go. Your Obd Servant, P. C. Bray."

This book was published at time in Australian law publishing history when indigenous publishing (as in pre-federated Australia) took root. Charles F. Maxwell was one of the first and, by the time of his death in 1889, most successful law publishers in Australia. From establishing his business in Melbourne in 1868, he expanded into New South Wales in 1879. Arthur Hayes was his manager there and he and his brothers successfully took over the N.S. W. part of the enterprise when Maxwell died. Both the Victorian and New South Welsh law publishing enterprises carried Maxwell's legacy into the twentieth century and were re-united under a single controlling entity in 1903. Edward William Lane (1801 – 1876) was British orientalist, translator and lexicographer. He is known for his Manners and Customs of the Modern Egyptians and the Arabic-English Lexicon, as well as his translations of One Thousand and One Nights and Selections from the Kur-án.




Lays of Ancient Rome is an 1842 collection of narrative poems, or lays, composed by Macaulay in his spare time when he was a "legal member" of the Governor-General of India's Supreme Council from 1834 to 1838. Four of these recount heroic episodes from early Roman history with strong dramatic and tragic themes, giving the collection its name. Macaulay also included two poems inspired by recent history: Ivry (1824) and The Armada (1832).



From the personal library of Queensland based artist and poet Billy Jones (1935 – 2012). The two notes are found on pp.144 and 148. At the first Jones or Coleman has pasted the author's address in Marina del Ray and at the second Jones recalls a one night stand in Laguna, 1980, that he believes led to her poem "6:50 PM. The Phone Rings. It's Him." The poem ends with the single word line "Billy." (pp.147–148), which lends some weight to his assertion.

First-hand account of an Able Seaman's service on H.M.A.S. Sydney (II) from May 1940 until drafted to another ship in January 1941; extensively covering the "hard-fought Mediterranean campaign", and with further entries until his arrival in the UK, April 1941.

newsprint pasted in : an address for Burgess c/- Kangaroo Point, Brisbane on the f.f.e.p. : in navy blue custom-made clamshell box with red title panel lettered in gilt. Re-backed; corners rubbed; light soiling.Very Good.

Able Seaman Burgess (1920-1952) served on one of Australia's best documented cruisers of WWII. The H.M.A.S. Sydney (II) was one of three British modified Leander Class light cruisers acquired by the RAN in the years immediately preceding World War II. Her sister ships were Perth and Hobart and in Australia they were known as Perth Class light cruisers. Burgess served on the Sydney from 1940-1941, a period described by the Australian Navy as, "the pinnacle of her career during the hard-fought Mediterranean campaign of World War II". [Australian Navy website]] He left her in Alexandria on Jan 11, 1941, having been drafted to crew a new cruiser that was to be collected from England and he spent the next three months on route to the U.K. The diary entries end on his arrival there in April. The Sydney was sunk with all hands in November 1941.

According to his service record, Burgess joined the Sydney as an Ordinary seaman in March 1939. He had joined the Australian Navy in July 1938, six weeks before his eighteenth birthday. His account begins four months later with Sydney searching for the Acquitania off the coast of W.A. but very soon he is describing being sent to Sumatra and then on to Alexandria and the theatre of war.

Like most young men of his generation he was deeply affected by his wartime experiences:

"Friday 28th [June]. I received my back pay for able seaman today 8 pounds. It came in handy to square all my debts from the April [?]. It has calmed down a lot today. We should expect to do something tomorrow. All going well we will arrive in Alex's next Wednesday. I was having a game of dominoes about 1/2 past 5 when station actions sounded off. We all closed up and shortly afterwards 3 destroyers were running. Naturally as were superior 5 cruisers against 3 destroyers we were firing continually and they were returning. I could see from the director several shots falling off our bows and a lot falling short [Burgess' action station at this time was Gyre Operator on the Direct Control Tower]. At one stage the only gun firing was the right of B. the other guns shell hoist were jammed. There were cleared after a while. There were several direct hits on one of the destroyers, we stayed behind and put a few more shots into her then she was finished we could see the men jumping off the


Although Burgess was an Able Seaman when he kept this diary, records show he was confirmed a Leading Seaman in 1943 and a Petty Officer in 1946. It appears from a pencil note on his service record that he passed away on July 1st, 1952.

There is a death notice in the SMH (2/7/52) for an ex-Petty Officer RAN Stanley Thomas Burgess. No cause of death is given. He was thirty-one years old when he died and was survived by a wife and two children. A quiet and early end for a young man who survived "the hard fought Mediterranean campaign" and was fortunate to be transferred to England before the H.M.A.S. Sydney sank with all hands.

The purpose of the Book Collecting Prize is to unearth and celebrate current book collecting passions and practices among young Australians so that every young and curious collector can play their part invigorating existing traditions whilst developing knowledge and building expertise.

Why a prize?

We believe that in establishing the prize we can unearth who is collecting, discover what exactly it is they collect, and help celebrate their passion and collecting endeavours.

Book collecting is fun, fascinating, and worthwhile. Over centuries, idiosyncratic and passionate collecting obsessions have led to new knowledge, new perspectives, to the filling out of social history and movements, and even to shifts in institutional collecting practices. We expect the next generation of collectors will make their own unique contributions to specialised knowledge by following their bliss, and our hope is that they enjoy themselves immensely and develop knowledge and skills as they do it.

Why young people?

The impulse to celebrate young collectors emerges from our desire to see the whole book collecting scene in Australia grow and be invigorated.

Book collecting is usually a solitary pastime. By establishing the prize, we hope to introduce young collectors to the existing community for inspiration and information. By exposing young collectors to traditional practices of collection curation and bibliography – by inviting them to book fairs, events, and into associations such as BCSA and BSANZ – they can begin to consciously engage with existing traditions and build expertise as they continue to collect.

In focusing on young collectors, we hope to make it clear that the prize is not being awarded for amassing a collection of great material value. It is true that some books accrue value over time, but we are not in the business of making predictions about this or encouraging others to do so. Instead, we are simply looking to the future, in which we see books and printed material continuing to play an important role and to occupy an important place in the cultural landscape.

We are seeking the curious young Australians who are already hunting and uncovering things they sense may have something interesting or new to tell us about ourselves and our world; and who, by their collecting foci; are preserving books and ephemeral items into the future.

The Archives Fine Book Collecting Prize for Young Collectors is open to all young Australian collectors up to the age of 35. Applications will open on August 28 and close on December 31. The prize winning collection will be announced in March 2024.
